
<u>Lamplighter</u>

For me, Easter is the high point of the whole church year. For me, and I pray for you, Easter is everything. We bring out the flowers and our best outfits, we practice impressive music, and prepare our best recipes. We don't want to hold anything back in our celebration!

HE is risen, but WE'VE BEEN FORGIVEN! We **shouldn't** hold anything back! But what does life look like after the lilies fade? When the music ends, the quests have gone home, and the special dishes are put away? It gets quieter, less colorful, a lot less fragrant, and considerably less joyful. In a word? Normal. Everyday. Ordinary. Things have this tendency to go right back to the way they were before. We get up in the morning and settle into our routines. After the lilies fade, it's the time of tax returns and appointments; expensive repairs and awkward replacements. When the lilies fade, and everything returns to normal, it's almost as if Easter never. even. happened.

We're reminded again of our frailty, and that things are not always right or good - in the world or in the church; not always right with ourselves. It would be wonderful if the lilies never faded, if the joy of Easter never departed from our lives and it carried through in all that we do.

There are seven Sundays of the season of Easter, after all.

But the other six are just not the same.
"The grass withers, the flower fades when the breath of the Lord blows on it; surely the people are grass." Isaiah 40:7

Such a fitting parallel to life in this world, isn't it? The beauty and joy are fleeting. They come and they go. Highs and lows. Cycles of birth, life, death, and rebirth.

"The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever." Isaiah 40:8

One thing can sustain Easter's triumph and joy in the world, in the church, in our lives, even when the lilies fade. In the face of weakness and decay, God's Word remains powerful and alive. Tax returns and appointments are no match for God's rejuvenating Gospel. Repairs and replacements can't begin to undo what God's saving Word has produced. Things may not always be right in the world, in the church, or within ourselves, but we are right with God.

The message of Easter rings out, even if after the music ends.

"He is not here! He is risen, just as he said."

The beauty of Easter remains even when the flowers fall. The joy of Easter endures, even in the mundane of everyday life.

Jesus said to his disciples (and to us,) "Peace be with you." Yes! Peace, for the taxes and appointments, the repairs and replacements, the everyday schedules and chores, the gettin' up and the lying down, the coming and the going. Rest in that peace. Rejoice in that hope! And continue to abide in His Word always, especially now that the lilies have faded.

Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! Pastor Dea

UMW Dorothy's Circle Pikes Peak United Methodist Church March

The March 1st meeting of the United Methodist Women's Dorothy Circle began at 1:30pm with nine ladies and one guest gentleman present.

This month we met at Trinity UMC Food Pantry. Delma Payne and Berta Skelton, who have a combined time of 30 years at the Pantry, had agreed to give Dorothy Circle a tour. We met Delma, Berta and Laura (another volunteer), for an introduction, then went into the Food Pantry. West Side Cares carefully screens families who are in need and supplies them with 6 food vouchers per family per year. Vouchers may be redeemed anytime in the year however, some families save two vouchers to use for Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday meals.

To redeem a voucher, each client fills out a food request form plus the voucher, which goes to a volunteer in the Pantry, who fills it and returns to the client a full, 4-day supply of food keeping in mind, as much as possible, how many are in the family and their individual's needs. Although there may be 58 families on one Tuesday, the next Tuesday will see a whole new set of clients.

Food donations come to the Pantry through three churches: Pikes Peak, Trinity and Wilson UMC, as well as Care and Share. Frozen day-old bread and pastries are picked up each week at Care and Share by Delma, and once a month, meat is purchased at 19 cents a pound. Whenever available, perishable foods such as fruits, veggies and sometimes eggs, are also picked up by Delma from Care and Share.




Pastor Dea captures the "moment" on Palm Sunday

Know Who Holds Tomorrow

Ira F. Stanphill, was an outstanding musician of the last century and author of "I Know Who Holds Tomorrow". If you don't recognize the title, it is on page 250 of the Favorite Hymns of Praise, blue book.

Ira was born on Valentine's Day, 1914, and gave his life to Jesus at age 12. He was a musician from 10 years old on, as he learned to play the piano, organ, guitar, and many other instruments and by age 17 was writing, singing and accompanying his own original gospel songs at prayer meetings, and revivals. At 22, Ira began preaching, was ordained at age 25, and brought the Gospel to 40 other countries as well as the United States.

His songs have been sung by such notable artists as Elvis Presley and Johnny Cash, with Ira being inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame in 1981. Throughout the many years of his life, Ira wrote over 500 hymns, published a Book, (This Side of Heaven), served over nine Christian Churches and appeared in several Southern Gospel music videos produced by Bill Gaither.

Ira died suddenly of a heart attack on December 30, 1993, leaving behind one son, two daughters and a tremendous gift of music for the world to enjoy!

This hymn history is dedicated to Bill Edwards, long-time member of PPUMC now living in Beaver Creek, OH.

Sunday, April 22 we'll have a "mission moment" in worship and introduce VICTORY SERVICE DOGS. The group believes that U.S. service members and veterans deserve independence and dignity. Those who struggle with PTSD (post-traumatic stress disorder) and physical or psychological challenges sometimes find achieving quality of life difficult and frustrating. That's where Victory Service Dogs comes in.

Research has proven that the bond between dogs and "their" humans is very powerful. Service dogs, like those trained by Victory Service Dogs, help to improve everyday life for individuals with disabilities; not only with the symptoms of PTSD but with mobility and a sense of well-being.

Victory Service Dogs operates as a client-trained program and strives to adopt shelter and rescue dogs when possible. In addition to financial support through donations, they welcome volunteers to help train and care for the dogs that will eventually serve.

Then, on Sunday, April 29, the first FIFTH SUNDAY of 2018, our "change for change" donations will be contributed to VICTORY SERVICE DOGS. Your generosity, on both Sundays, will be put to good use.
