I shared, at the beginning of the year, that my "word of the year" is *notice*. Here we are, turning the page of another month, ALREADY, and I continue to hone that ability to *notice* God's Presence in my everyday life. I'm not necessarily talking about *noticing* in my Bible study time (although it IS good practice) but how God works in the ordinary. Scripture shows us burning bushes and talking donkeys and we read about God's voice (booming or the still small kind). God goes to great lengths to communicate with us.

Yes, there are epiphanies – moments of revelation, but as I (and I pray YOU) *work at noticing God's Presence*, isn't God's timing amazing? There are those "mundane made holy" moments – a note from a friend or a deer making an appearance *just after we've prayed* for a sign! A devotional book that I'm reading for Lent, Jill J. Duffield's <u>Lent in Plain Sight</u>, notes that "often it is in hindsight that God's providence becomes recognizable."

So, a couple questions come up: Do we have the eyes to see (*to notice*) God's Presence? Do we have the ears to hear the voice of the Lord – which may come in a myriad of languages? CAN EVERYDAY OBJECTS REMIND US TO PAY ATTENTION? Lent began on Ash Wednesday, at the end of February. During the forty days (not counting Sundays) until Easter we can practice being open to the closeness of the Kingdom of God, to follow Jesus closer, and be awake to the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives. This a season of quiet contemplation that will bring us to the celebration of the empty tomb in April. Lent is a time to **notice** the possibility and the promise that God is present.

I'll be using ordinary objects for the sermon message focus each Sunday until Easter. Ordinary things like bread and coins, shoes and coats, towels and thorns. Do you notice anything that these things have in common? Hmmmm, hope to see you in God's house for worship so that we notice together.

I pray that these forty days, this season of Lent, will, *as we notice the power of God around us*, (as Ms. Duffield suggests) "lower our anxiety about the future, lessen our burdens about the past, and free us to follow Jesus in faith right here and now." This will enable us to risk more for the Gospel!

I look forward to **noticing** with you through Lent and all the days ahead as we hone our sense of the holy in every single moment...and we act accordingly.

We've been blessed. Continue to be a blessing! Pastor Dea

"Stand up, Stand Up for Jesus"

In 1858, only a few years before the Civil War, two associate Ministers, George Duffield, Jr. and Dudley Atkins Tyng were speaking to a YMCA meeting of 5,000 men in Pennsylvania. Tyng gave the sermon from Exodus 10:11 "Go now ve that are men, and serve the Lord", converting over 1,000 men from that crowd! Within a month Tyng died from a farming accident, but on his death bed told his father, "Tell my brethren of the ministry, wherever you meet them, to stand up for Jesus". Duffield, so moved by these encouraging words, wrote the hymn, "Stand up, Stand Up for **Jesus**", including these words from the scripture in Exodus, "Ye that are men now serve Him." When the song was published the following year, it became popular with both Union and Confederate soldiers and is still sung in many churches today.

After midnight, with all the believers of the congregation standing in darkness, the priest then brings in a tall, lighted candle. He lights the candles of others around him who take that flame and pass it around until the church and surrounding courtyard is awash in candlelight. What an inspiration, showing people the Light of the world, sent by God to save us!
