That said, if you like the thrill of going in circles, roundabouts are probably your cup of tea. As we enter into this season of Advent, however, we are reminded of the words of the Prophet Isaiah, through Mark's pen...or quill.

"See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,'" (Mark 1:2-3, NRSV).

John the Baptist, said Mark, is that messenger; and he came to proclaim the One who is all about making our lives straight and true. Remember that old saying? "Stop the merry-go-round! I want to get off!" The Baptizer is pointing to the One who promises that we don't have to stay on the endless looping of a chaotic life. He was proclaiming the advent of a new way; a life-giving way. Only, we know that the Advent really began roughly 30 years earlier, at the birth of the Child.

David Hays was born in Kirksville, MO in 1948. His dad, Wilmer, was from Kirksville, MO and his mom, Louise, was from Colorado Springs. David's sister, Cheryl, was born two years after David in Wichita, where his dad was working, and where the family lived through David's first grade year. After that, the family moved to Colorado Springs. David attended Midland Elementary and West Junior High. His 7th Grade English teacher had taught both his mother, aunts and uncles, so it was a difficult year as they excelled in English! He attended Palmer High School through his sophomore year, when the family moved to Santa Cruz.

David graduated from Soquel High School, then spent four years in the US Air Force as a specialist working on Doppler and Inertial Navigation Aids on HC130H Air Rescue and C141 aircraft. In 1970, after the military, David went to Antioch College in Yellow Springs, OH, where he spent a semester working in Montgomery and Charleston, WV counseling disabled coal miners on Black Lung Disease.

During the break between spring and summer semesters David attended a Native American Healing Powwow in Okemah, OK. As a result of that visit he became a college drop-out at the same time his mother was graduating from college with her teaching certificate. David moved back to California. He attended the Los Angeles School of Chiropractic, graduating in 1977 and starting his own practice in Glendale, CA in 1978.

In January 1994 David and his parents returned to Colorado Springs. He cared for both of his parents until his mom passed away in December, 2011 and his father in July, 2013. David sold his parents' house in July 2014, when, he said, he "was homeless (houseless) for two months" until he purchased his new (old) home on W. Bijou. "I can walk to church," he says.

David joins Pikes Peak on transfer of membership from Calvary United Methodist Church.
