I have spent this afternoon in a bit of a state of writer's block. The subject of generational repentance—and forgiveness—has been rumbling around in my head. As you will see from Ann Keetch's article, the Annual Conference this year centered on the theme of Healing Relationships. We will be hearing quite a bit about this concept over the next few months. Generational repentance/forgiveness is something that affects all of us, though it may feel like a fairly new concept. Whether we are cognizant of it or not generational wounds in some way or another shape who we are as individual personalities and people of God. It's just that sometimes the histories are so embedded in our personal past or even our culture, that we don't always recognize the influence they have on our lives, interactions and relationships.

Think about it, though. We are all aware of the lingering effects of racism and tension from the Civil War. I grew up in the South, where even if people "play nice" in public, dividing lines—both geographically and all-to-often philosophically—still exist between some whites and African Americans. That history continues to affect the way people on both sides of the color line think and act and live, even if they don't go around talking about slavery all the time. (Cont'd on pg 2)

Think of World War II and the Holocaust. Did you read the Lamplighter last month? If so you read a fascinating story about one of our members whose mother was a Czechoslovakian Jew, but who was compelled to keep her ethnic identity hidden for many years, even after the war was over, as a result of the emotional impact of living through the war under Hitler's ethnic cleansing policies. Her personal history deeply impacted not only the rest of the mother's life, but has influenced her daughter as well.

Of course, in the May issue of the Lamplighter you saw a glimpse of the deep, lingering wounds experienced by the Cheyenne and Arapahoe descendants of the Sand Creek Massacre. It is this history—the history of a massacre planned and led by United Methodists—that we will grapple with over the next few months. After all, it may not feel as if we are connected to that horrible tragedy 150 years ago. But whether our past links directly to the perpetrators (or victims) of the massacre or not, as United Methodists, we hold something very fragile and special...a chance to be the representatives of generational repentance that will bring about healing of profound wounds suffered by the descendants of those massacred.

This idea shouldn't shock us. In fact, isn't that what Christ modeled? Bringing wholeness and healing to the hearts of the people? After all, it wasn't Jesus' sins that took him to the cross...it was ours. He brought repentance on our behalf, between us and Almighty God. And as those who have been forgiven, recipients of unmerited grace, we should always strive to model the heart and attitude of Jesus Christ.

This month we welcomed Bethany Howell,
Community Education Director for LaPuente
Mission in Alamosa, Colorado. This worthwhile
Mission has been supported by Dorothy Circle
for many years and as usual we filled 35
migrant worker bags with personal care
essentials. Bags from our UMW are in high
demand at the Mission because the well-made,
attractive cloth bags contain a wide variety of
items, all of which are in excellent condition.
Because of the generosity of the kind folks of
our congregation, several bags of extra items
were also sent along to the Mission! Thank you
to everyone who helped with this mission
project!

An update from Bethany on the work at LaPuente helped us understand the continuing work at the Mission. LaPuente runs a food pantry 365 days a year for the residents of Alamosa. Meals are served daily to the migrant workers who go to the fields to harvest potatoes, barley, lettuce and quino. The Mission also provides lodging for over 11,000 individuals a year, emergency shelter and case management services for families going through difficult times. Education is a priority at the Mission for children and adults alike, continuing throughout the summer and filling in when school lets out in the spring. Greeting cards were sent to many in our church family who are either ill or needing an uplifting message of hope from our UMW. It is amazing what a small group of women such as Dorothy Circle can do in the service and for the honor of God! Many of the other members of the church had greater financial resources than she had, but that didn't matter to her at all. She was a giver.

At her funeral service, several adults continued to try to analyze her generosity. "Why? Why?" they asked each other. Finally, a teen-age girl, who belonged to one of the poorer families, spoke up. "I asked her one day, 'Why are you so nice to all of us?' She told me, 'It's my way of thanking God for all that I have been given. Besides, I get so much joy out of trying to help others. It's just a lot of fun.'" Mary was a living example of stewardship in action.

We were invited to travel to the site of the Sand Creek Massacre, extending the hand of God and reconciliation to the Native American descendants of the massacre.

My thoughts were, "I'm not sure why I am asking for forgiveness for the acts of a Colorado Methodist active military officer who led the attack on Sand Creek. Yes, I was born into the Methodist church and decided to continue my life as a Methodist. But, I was born in Missouri and 150 years after the massacre. Do the Cheyenne and Arapaho people really hold the acts of these people against me?"

We heard the pain as the descendants spoke of the unspeakable acts of brutality at Sand Creek. History is shared through spoken word rather than a written history. When spoken the history comes to life and remains ever present.

The people of the Cheyenne and Arapaho opened their hands with grace, inviting us to forgive and heal the generational and cultural wounds caused by the Massacre. God showed his face and healing powers. By the end of Annual Conference I knew I wasn't part of this atrocity but I could extend my hand with God's love and help let people feel His love.

In November a Healing Run will begin at the Sand Creek site and continue to the Colorado State Capital in Denver. There will be opportunities for our church to help. Watch for more information about this later.


