

God's gifts amount to an inconvenient reality among us; they remind us that what we have come to regards as "normal" continues a deep abnormality in which we may have no complacency."

Family of Faith, let's consider what the world would be like with God at the center of it. Let's journey through November in a time of change and put **off** the old, put **on** the new. And as the old hymn says (with thanksgiving) "All good gifts around us are sent from heaven above."

We're on the receiving end!

Praise God for the new things that are ahead of us this month. There's plenty in this newsletter – things to be thankful about and work to do to bring the Kingdom more evident so that others can experience the same thankfulness. I'm blessed to be in ministry with you so continue to be....

UMW Dorothy's Circle

Pikes Peak United Methodist Church October

The October 7th meeting of the United Methodist Women's Dorothy Circle began with reciting the Purpose of the United Methodist Women by the seven ladies present.

Our Spiritual Growth Leader, Beulah Shaw read an uplifting selection from **The Daily Bread Devotional** booklet. The reading focused on "Remembering" as a spiritual discipline. Because we don't always remember as well as we used to, daily singing of hymns, memorizing scripture and reading our Bible can keep us connected to God in spite of life's changes. Thank you Beulah!

Our original speaker from the Springs Rescue Mission was unable to meet with us on our usual date of Thursday, October 6th, however did send Natasha Allen on Friday, the 7th so we had our meeting one day late. Please forgive us for not getting the word out to everyone about the change! Natasha told us that 2016 is the 20th anniversary of the Springs Rescue Mission here in Colorado Springs! Natasha reminded us of their mission statement, "Because of our love for and obedience to God, our mission is to mobilize the community to provide relief, rehabilitation and empowerment services." What a privilege it has been for our UMW to support them for many of those 20 years! The Rescue is adding another 150-bed shelter opening on November 10, 2016. In previous years the winter shelter was only open November through April, however this new facility will be open year around and will use a lottery system for clients to stay one week at a time.

We were shocked to find out that over 31,000 households live BELOW the poverty line in El Paso County; over 1,000 people are homeless and more than 240 people are unsheltered every night of the year! The Rescue Mission is dedicated to end this homelessness with a well-structured plan that, with the help of the community, will be a multi-agency campus designed to help every person living on the streets of Colorado Springs find a pathway out of homelessness!

Our Dorothy Circle was able to send our usual speaker's fee and more than 20 bags and boxes of donated items back with Natasha to the Rescue Mission. Tours of the Springs Rescue Mission are being given on the following days: Wednesday, November 16 and Wednesday, December 14 at 1pm. You may speak to a UMW member about joining us or call the Mission at 632-1822 to join one of these free tours.

The September minutes were approved as read. Treasurer, Jessie Cooper gave President Brown and Secretary Arnold copies of the monthly bank report that listed our annual pledge donation of \$240 as having been sent on to the National UMW. Thank you Jessie for all your work!

Cards are being sent to several of our members who have health issues, and those who are having birthdays or anniversaries, thank you Beulah for sending these personal greetings!

President Brown asked what we would like to send the newly elected Bishop, and it was decided to send a booklet of our beautiful stained glass windows as a welcome. Jessie suggested we take a tour of the Rescue Mission and Ethel suggested we could do this instead of having one of our regular speakers in the spring. President Brown will look into this. Deb Mitguard of West Side Cares and the CSPD Senior Victims Assistance group were also suggested as speakers for next year

Ethel Pierson passed out the UMW prayer sheets to close our program at 2:35 pm. Delicious refreshments of pumpkin pie and whipped cream were provided by Jessie, thank you to both ladies for their service!

We will be back to our regular schedule on the first Thursday of November (the 3rd), at 1:30 for our annual fellowship/craft meeting. Ruth Reed will be providing crafts for this meeting, Gretchen will provide refreshments. Please feel free to attend our meetings, we would love to have you join us! Most Sincerely,

Silent Night

This beautiful and beloved Christmas hymn is so well known by the world over that it was pronounced as an intangible cultural heritage by the **United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO)** in 2011.

In 1816, in Oberndorf, Austria, the young priest Father Joseph Mohr had written words to his new Christmas song. The lyrics required a fitting melody however, so just before Christmas Eve in 1818, Father Joseph went to his friend Franz Xaver Gruber, schoolteacher and organist, and asked him to compose a musical tune for the new song. It would appear however, that the church's organ was not working at the time, so Franz composed music for guitar accompaniment and on Christmas Eve, the two friends performed the first public presentation of Silent Night, or as it was originally written in German: "Stille Nacht, heilige Nacht" (Silent Night Holy Night).

Over the next hundred years, Silent Night became so popular that on Christmas Eve in 1914, during the first year of World War I, both German and English translations of Silent Night were sung across fields of barbed wire and in muddy trenches bringing God's peace and love to a land of war and hatred, even if only for a little while!

Silent Night is probably the best known Christmas Hymn in the world and has been translated into more than 140 languages. Since then, on Christmas Eve, Churches everywhere have paused to listen and reflect on that first, Silent Night, Holy Night.

Classic Sugar Cookies

- 1 1/2 cups powdered sugar
- 1 cup butter or margarine, softened
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 1 egg
- 2 1/2 cups Gold Medal™ all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon cream of tartar
- Granulated sugar or colored sugar

Mix powdered sugar, butter, vanilla, almond extract and egg in large bowl. Stir in remaining ingredients except granulated sugar. Cover and refrigerate at least 2 hours. Heat oven to 375°F. Lightly grease cookie sheet. Divide dough in half. Roll each half 1/4 inch thick on lightly floured surface. Cut into desired shapes with 2- to 2 1/2-inch cookie cutters. Sprinkle with granulated sugar. Place on cookie sheet. Bake 7 to 8 minutes or until edges are light brown. Remove from

cookie sheet. Cool on wire rack. Carol


